However, this conference, the latest of a series on the teaching of Canadian history organized by the Association for Canadian Studies over the past decade or so, goes beyond commemoration, examining the relationship between commemoration, history, and history education. Like the previous conferences, this event brings together a wide range of stakeholders in history education, including historians, history education scholars, museum educators, archivists, representatives of public history organizations, history teachers, and policy-makers. However, a unique aspect of this event is the involvement of high school students. The Guardians of Confederation, a youth leadership conference, which runs concurrently, brings together students from Prince Edward Island high schools with students from each of the provinces and territories. Their task is to consider the historical making of Canadian Confederation and to emerge with a new vision for confederation. There are several opportunities for our attendees to take part in Guardian activities. The other special aspect of this event is the annual Symons lecture on the State of Canadian Confederation, to which our conference attendees are invited. Historical consciousness involves consideration of the past in order to inform both our understanding of the present and our decisions about the future. In so doing, they will examine the artifact collection, reflect upon the narratives they encounter, and re-consider how history museum exhibits could be adapted for their own classroom use. The practical knowledge and skills gained from this workshop will be beneficial for those interested in project-based learning, problem-based learning, and historical thinking in museums.
