This report highlights THEN/HiER activities between April 1, 2015 and March 31, 2016.

THEN/HiER is the first pan-Canadian organization devoted to promoting—and improving—history teaching and learning by bringing together the multiple and varied constituencies involved in history education: academic historians; public historians in museums, archives and historic sites; practicing teachers; history education scholars; and curriculum policy-makers. Our goal is to create more research-informed practice (from kindergarten to graduate school) and more practice-informed research through engagement involving these various communities.

Project Goals

Stated in SSHRC Proposal (November 2007)

- Nurture a community of inquiry among academic historians; public historians in museums, archives and historic sites; practicing teachers; researchers based in faculties of education; graduate students; policy makers and other stakeholders.
- Provide opportunities for engagement with, and critique of, existing research in the field of history education, with the aim of bridging research and practice.
- Encourage research in classrooms involving collaboration between academics and teachers.
- Transform classroom practice through pro-active connections with ministries of education, textbook publishers, other curriculum developers, and practicing teachers. We will collaboratively develop textbook publications, teacher resource materials and on-line museum-based activities and other digital resources, for schools.
- Disseminate current Canadian and international research on history education out of the universities to broader communities of stakeholders.
- Establish and nurture fertile research connections with international stakeholders.
- Engage in the development of authentic approaches to assessment of students' historical literacy through a partnership with the Benchmarks of Historical Thinking project (now the Historical Thinking Project), developed by the Centre for the Study of Historical Consciousness, UBC. Well conceived assessments, in conjunction with curriculum materials and professional development, are a powerful driver of the reform of history education itself.

1. Create a more robust history education **research** culture in Canada as defined by:
 - increasing opportunities for collaboration among scholars, educators, and other stakeholders
 - increasing the circulation of Canadian and international research findings
2. Improve history education **policy** across Canada by:
 - promoting research on history education policy
 - promoting research-informed history education policy
 - nurturing dialogue among education stakeholders (including academic historians; public historians in museums, archives and historic sites; practicing teachers; researchers based in faculties of education; graduate students; policy makers and other stakeholders) about history education policy
3. Improve history education **practice** by:
 - increasing communication and collaboration among history education stakeholders
 - disseminating research findings in educational settings
 - encouraging teachers to apply history education research
 - identifying and nurturing communities of practitioners
 - promoting informed uses of new media within history education
4. Develop research-informed **assessment** of history learning by:
 - promoting research on history assessment
 - disseminating research on assessment among policy makers and teachers
5. Provide **advocacy** by:
 - serving as a public voice for history education in Canada
 - generating research-informed policy briefs

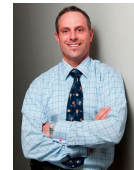

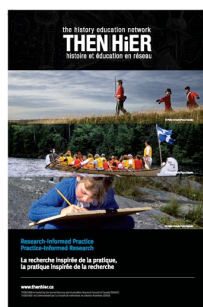
Facilities

Anne Marie was the only full-time employee attached to the Network and handled both major projects and day-to-day activities, including administration of the interactive website, writing the monthly *e-Bulletin* and the *Annual Review*, keeping promotional materials up to date, disseminating information about THEN/HiER to our partners and the public, supervising graduate student research assistants, assisting in organizing our Annual Regional Conference and other conferences, organizing the Vancouver *Approaching the Past* series, and overseeing all administrative operations of the Network.

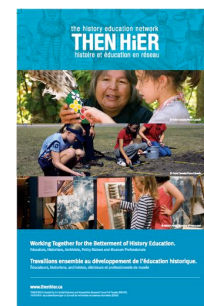

Our brochure and other materials related to Network activities were regularly updated and available at conferences and presentations attended by THEN/HiER Board members and upon request. All pamphlets were bilingual and included a QR (Quick Response) Code to our website. We also had a flyer for the THEN/HiER book series.



Annual Review and e-Bulletin (goals 2 and 3)



We have published our *Annual Review* at the end of each fiscal year since 2010/11 (prior to this we published a biannual *Newsletter*). It was sent to all members and partner organizations on the THEN/HiER listserv (over 1,400 this year). In order to save costs on envelopes and postage, we have not sent hard copies to members by mail for the past two years. However, we printed copies as needed for events such as conferences. The *Annual Review* highlights activities from the previous year's *e-Bulletins* in order to provide a summary of important activities over the course of the year. We sent out twelve issues of our monthly *e-Bulletin* over the

Neil Orford, a history teacher in the Upper Grand District School Board, discusses a program he designed and implemented called the Digital Historian Project, which attempts to tie together History and Math through a blended learning environment. In this video Neil outlines his motivations as well as the program's core vision.

New Directions in Active History-Brent Pavey, Simulating History: The Use of Historical and Political Simulations in the History Classroom

Brent Pavey, Head of History at Waterloo Collegiate Institute, shares his vision of how to engage students in political and historical debates. He explains numerous simulations which he has implemented in the classroom from mock UN Security Council meetings to Confederation debates. Pavey explains that the goal of these projects is to “engage students so they can imagine fulfilling the shoes of political and historical figures.”

New Directions in Active History-Lindsay Hall, Developing Historical Detectives

Lindsay Hall, Head of History at Clark Road Secondary in the Thames Valley District School Board, discusses the challenges facing teachers of history in the public school system. Hall explains that since students are required to only take one Canadian history class throughout high school, teachers must strive to instill curiosity in their grade 9 students. Hall provides examples of innovative activities and projects designed to build student confidence and subsequently, encourage students to take an interest in studying the past.

New Directions in Active History-Jean-Pierre Morin, The Future of Public History Programs in North America and Abroad

Jean-Pierre Morin, a member of the board of directors of the National Council on Public History, offers insight on the growth and decline of Public History programs in north America, as well as internationally.

Dr. John Walsh, co-ordinator of the Master’s of Public History program at Carleton University, discusses the tension often present in Public History programs between theory and practice. He advocates for programs to offer a combination of reading and hands-on projects.

THEN/HiER co-hosted a reception on June 3, 2015 at the Congress of the Humanities and Social Sciences with the Canadian Association of Foundations of Education (CAFE) and the Educational Research Unit (ERU), University of Ottawa. The reception followed a keynote address by Chad Gaffield, Past President of the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) and current Professor of History and University Research Chair in Digital Scholarship at the University of Ottawa. At the reception, the 2015 THEN/HiER Publication Award was presented to Vincent Boutonnet, professor at the Université du Québec en Outaouais, for his dissertation *Les ressources didactiques : typologie d’usages en lien avec la méthode historique et l’intervention éducative d’enseignants d’histoire au secondaire*, which he completed at the Université de Montréal, 2013 (Marc-André Éthier, supervisor). Boutonnet’s work provides a comprehensive account of teachers’ perceptions and uses of textbooks in the teaching of history. The study is an essential contribution to our understanding of history education in the context of Québec curricular reform.

Annual Regional Conference

THEN/HiER held its fifth and final Annual Regional Conference on June 4 and 5, 2015 in Ottawa. Finding Franklin: New Approaches to Teaching Canadian History featured speakers from the Great Unsolved Mysteries in Canadian History (GUMICH), the Nunavut Department of Education (NDE), Parks Canada, and the Centre for Oral History at Concordia University. Its focus was on new approaches to teaching and learning history through curriculum materials and a new GUMICH website developed around the search for the missing Franklin ships, [*The Franklin Mystery: Life and Death in the Arctic*](#). Approaching the Past – Fredericton

The Fredericton area *Approaching the Past* series is organized by **Katherine Ireland**, PhD candidate at the University of New Brunswick.

Silent Stones and Letters Home: Doing Soldier Biographies in the Classroom – November 2, 2015

This event took place in Fredericton at the Provincial Archives and centred on using the *Lest We Forget* Project to craft soldier biographies as entry points into the study of the wars. Speakers Diane MacLeod, James Rowinski, Mark Perry and Alan Sears shared their experiences using soldier bios in the classroom from elementary school to post-secondary. Students from Kennebecasis Valley High School as well as graduates of George Street Middle School spoke about their experiences doing soldier biographies as learners, and how this approach allowed them to find their own entry points as well as explore the experience of war in multiple ways.

This bilingual event at the Musée acadien de l'Université de Moncton featured speakers Greg Kennedy (Université de Moncton), Jeanne-Mance Cormier (Musée acadien), and Daniel Bourgeois (l'école Mathieu-Marti de Dieppe).

Understanding the Experience of War Through Drama and Theatre – March 2, 2016

This event took place at the New Brunswick Museum in Saint John and featured Maryanne Lewell (Saint John High School), Stephan Tobias (Saint John Theatre Company), and Dr. Cheryl Fury (University of New Brunswick).

Approaching the Past – Vancouver

The Vancouver *Approaching the Past* series is organized by **Anne Marie Goodfellow**, Network Manager.

Queen Elizabeth Park and Bloedel Conservatory – April 29, 2015

This event featured Vicky Earle, VanDusen Botanical Garden Governor, and John Coupar, Vancouver Park Board Chair, who spoke about the history of the park and iconic conservatory,

techniques used in the recent roof restoration project and unique stories of the lives of the plants and birds that call Bloedel home.

History of Baseball in Vancouver – June 17, 2015

Kit Krieger, Society for American Baseball Research, Tom Hawthorn, newspaper and magazine writer, and Josh Coward, Executive Director of the Nikkei Place Foundation, provided informative talks on Vancouver baseball history at Nat Bailey Stadium. After the talks, Kit gave a tour of the Bud Kerr Baseball Museum, located inside the stadium.

Old Hastings Mill Store Museum – October 7, 2015

This evening included a slide show on the history of the store and museum by local author and historian Lisa Smith, followed by participants touring the museum and trying their hand at “Lumberjack Bingo” and “Chinook Look,” activities designed to teach students about the collection.

Vancouver Maritime Museum and St. Roch National Historic Site – November 26, 2015

This event included a presentation about the Vancouver Maritime Museum’s education programs, with an emphasis on its Arctic programs in conjunction with the current feature exhibit, *Across the Top of the World: Quest for the Northwest Passage*. Participants then enjoyed a guided tour, led by a docent, aboard the RCMPV *St. Roch*.

Roedde House Museum – March 2, 2016

This museum is a late-Victorian home in the Queen Anne revival style built in 1893 for the family of Gustav Roedde, Vancouver’s first bookbinder. The tour of the museum focused on its school programs to support the Grade 4 and 5 Social Studies and Language Arts and Grade 6 and 7 Language Arts curricula.
